Tn the nearly two hours it took for Mayor ■ Jerry Dyer to present his proposed budget for the 2024 fiscal year, utility costs, public infrastructure and Fresno's police budget drew considerable attention by members of the public and city council.

On May 18, Dyer proposed increasing the city budget to about \$1.85 billion, \$40 million greater than the 2023 fiscal year amended budget. Under his proposal, 13 city departments would end up with larger budgets this year.

Dyer is seeking to expand the city's public utilities budget by \$48.8 million, the public works budget by \$42.3 million and the police budget by about \$25.5 million. Those budget increases would accommodate a trash rate increase, two dozen new traffic lights and 50 new sworn police officers.

This comes after the city budgeted for \$2.3 billion in net revenue over the course of the 2023 fiscal year, and the mayor anticipates the city will generate that sum along with \$82 million more — in net revenue next year. Much of that increased revenue comes from special taxes like Measure C and Measure P.

Prior to the Thursday presentation, several members of the public gave comment on how exorbitant the police budget is, how rents in the city need to be reigned in, the need for more to be done to keep people from becoming homeless and criticism of the proposed budget being released only an

hour prior to the mayor's presentation in the council chambers.

The process to approve the 2024 fiscal year city budget over the next month is on. That includes subcommittee budget meetings, three public budget hearings in the first week of June, followed by a June 14 city council vote on budget motions and a final June 22 council vote to officially approve the city budget.

About 50 new police hires and over six dozen new vehicles

Dyer is seeking to raise the police budget to \$261 million, an increase of \$25.5 million, to fund an aggressive hiring strategy and purchase a myriad of police vehicles and equipment. Back in the 2021 fiscal year the police budget was \$210 million.

Although the Fresno Police Department never had more sworn police officers on its payroll than this year, so far with 848 officers, Chief Paco Balderrama and Mayor Dyer do not have intentions to stop there. Balderrama told KSEE24 in April that he plans to bring Fresno's total police force to 900 sworn officers. Dyer's proposal budgets for that goal, although it's not specified under authorized position changes and mentioned briefly in the mayor's message at the beginning of the proposed budget document.

Dyer has also budgeted millions for police equipment and vehicles in his proposal, including \$33,900 for the first annual lease payment on a new armored tactical vehicle for the Fresno Police Department's SWAT team. Dyer is also seeking to purchase 47 new patrol vehicles, 15 plain unmarked vehicles, 15 new motorcycles, one new police transit van and three canine patrol vehicles.

Dyer's proposal notes that yearto-date violent crime is down nearly 20% and homicides have decreased by more than 60%. He went on to attribute lower crime statistics to increased "staffing levels and partnerships." Fresnoland has yet to hear back from a city spokesperson on questions regarding these crime statistics.

"When crime is up, the police department asks for more resources and this body has granted it," said Councilmember Miguel Arias at the May 18 presentation. "When crime is down, the police department credits police for reduction in crime and they ask for more money. I've yet to see the actual data that correlates more officers or more police resources to reduction in crime."

Arias added that if there's no difference in the quality of service provided by the police, after hiring more and more of them, he wants to know why.

"Ultimately, this body has increased your budget by a record amount," Arias said. "We're not seeing that reflected in better and faster service for the end customer — which are residents, businesses and projects in which we're in a housing crisis."

That housing crisis gets several mentions in Dyer's proposal. Most notable is his goal for over 3,000 new affordable housing units in Fresno by 2025. But in the midst of louder calls for rent control in Fresno, Dyer's budget anticipates a \$24.7 million decrease in funding for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program, due to sunsetting grants from federal and state funds. The program provided emergency financial assistance to landlords and renters since the COVID-19 pandemic.

The mayor's proposed budget, in some places, carries over unused dollars that have already been allocated to in previous years for affordable housing. For example, a key detail of the 2023 fiscal year budget was \$40 million in ARPA dollars that would support new affordable housing developments.

However, one year later, Dyer's proposed budget for the 2024 fiscal year mentions re-budgeting \$41.9 million in ARPA dollars to build housing.

An incoming trash rate increase

Dyer emphasized the need to increase the city's public utilities department budget, to accommodate anticipated increases in PG&E costs and compounding needs in the city's water and wastewater divisions which have gone unaddressed for the last two years and forced the department to dig into its cash reserves.

Dyer's proposal seeks to expand the public utilities budget to \$389.6 million, a \$48.8 million increase. He said that Fresno

residents can anticipate a proposal in the near future to raise the city's solid waste rate in order to generate revenue that would cover needed financial investments for the city's waste and wastewater division.

"The last solid waste rate increase that we experienced in the city of Fresno was in 2009," Dyer said at the presentation Thursday. "Over that time, fuel has increased, PG&E costs have increased, salaries have increased — we've had inflation."

Councilmember Arias asked Dyer how much he anticipated the solid waste rate would increase, but didn't get a specific answer from the mayor. City Manager Georgeanne White jumped in to say that she would have to circle back on what a sufficient rate increase would look like, although she said the city's solid waste division would face a \$12 million deficit without a rate increase next year.

Dyer's proposed budget also anticipates almost \$953,100 in revenue next year when the city's public utilities department will newly resume charging Fresno residents for utility late payments and shut-offs.

"I just want to point out, I'm going to be looking to what better service are we going to provide the customer for a higher fee," said Councilmember Miguel Arias.

Improvements to roads, bus stops and

Dyer's proposed \$42.3 million expansion to the city's public works department would establish a new team dedicated to fixing potholes — yes, the ones on Shaw and everywhere else in Fresno. Dyer projects it would cost \$1.77 million to establish the necessary crews and equipment.

The public works budget expansion would also establish 24 new traffic signals, 18 traffic signal modifications and improvements to specific crosswalks to make them more visible.

The city's FAX public transportation system would also be getting an increased budget—by \$26.6 million. Some of that will go toward continuing free ridership agreements with the Fresno Unified School District and potential agreements with Fresno State and State Center Community College District. The added funding would also go towards improving bus stops and upgrading FAX facilities.

Dyer's budget proposal also contains over 60 park projects using American Rescue Plan (ARPA) funds, Community Development Block Grants, Prop 68 dollars and Measure P revenue. For example, \$230,000 in ARPA dollars will be used to install new pickleball courts at Vinland Park and Rotary East Park; \$4.3 million in Measure P revenue will be used to rehabilitate restrooms, add lighting and pickleball courts to Roeding Park.

Dyer also noted that city budget staffers made an error in calculating projected tax revenue from Measure P, a tax meant to generate funding to improve and maintain Fresno's parks and facilities, build new parks and trails, and fund recreation, community, and arts programs. Now, based on corrected projection methodology, the mayor anticipates the city will generate \$48 million in Measure P tax revenue next fiscal year.

Dyer's proposed budget is 480 pages long, touches every single city department and would set in motion major financial

investments across Fresno. In June, the city council will hold five budget hearings, to which members of the public are welcome to attend and share their sentiments about what deserves investment with city dollars.

What's next?

Budget hearings will be held June 5-7, 14, and 22 at 9 a.m. at the Fresno Council Chambers, located at 2600 Fresno Street. Interested residents can also participate via

ON THE SCENE - ETHICS IN CLEANING

Trime scene cleaning may not seem like ✓a career path that many would willingly venture into, let alone want to read about, but the taboo surrounding the death-care industry is starting to crack open. People are curious about the work done behind the

Before the 19th century, death mainly occurred in the home. Families were the ones responsible for handling their deceased loved ones. Back then, crime scene cleaners began as simple community members. For example, these cleaners were mothers in church groups and friends within the neighborhood who would come together after accidents. But at the turn of the 20th century, as institutions like hospitals and funeral homes took over caring for the deceased, our connection to death care changed drastically. Now, in the 21st century, death care is changing once again.

There is no shortage of resumes from people wanting to perform this service, which makes sense. With feelings of powerlessness in the wake of a public loss or a personal connection to suicide, community members are again looking for ways to help.

Tragedy is in the spotlight like never before. As of May 2023, there have been over 200 mass shootings in the United States, which equates to at least one mass killing per week since the start of the new year. With social media as a driving force in exposure—Reaper Clean's phone line has received numerous calls from young people wanting to join the team.

With the heightened interest in this career comes the responsibility to educate without sensationalizing the work or violating the privacy of customers. There is a death-positive movement taking place in the United States right now. A growing number of people share the belief that talking about death openly is necessary. It's time to destigmatize facing our mortality, and crime scene cleaners are embracing this audience to create open and honest conversations about the work. Nevertheless, this is all still a fairly new exploration, and the narrative of ethics in which to do this is still being created.

Reaper Clean is very direct about its service capability as well as its advocacy

in the field of crime scene cleaning. As a small biohazard remediation business in the central valley, the independent company prefers marketing off-scene. The company wants to tell stories, share resources, and get involved in the issues that intersect with their work,

such as suicide prevention and grief support. If it comes down to sharing content while on-scene, the cleaners have guidelines to ensure they aren't degrading the space.

Discussions either focus on the work itself or offer educational value to the public or other crime scene cleaners. Technicians should not be revealing secrets, exposing bizarre collections, or speaking ill of the dead in any way. Humor as a coping mechanism to get through the task is perfectly okay. However, exploiting these moments on social media or publicly degrading any life that existed in the space being serviced is not okay. Images should display educational information or service capability. Trigger warnings should be attached before images are shown. With these things in mind, it becomes easier to discern the quality of care

delivered by the service provider offering the content.

For those interested in crime scene cleaning as a career, restoring intimate spaces after a trauma has occurred is no easy task. Crime scene cleaners arrive on-site at abnormal hours, preparing to spend a substantial amount of time in someone's home performing structural remediation work. The manual labor required to remediate hazardous situations can be exhausting and requires creativity per every unique circumstance. Crime scene cleaners also have the sole responsibility of going through the privacy of a person's belongings and either restoring them or discarding them due to saturation or contact with potentially infectious material. While gloved hands are sifting through the life of a person who is no longer with us, a level of compassion and professionalism must remain in the room. It isn't about just having the stomach for something like this; it's about having a steady heart.

Here's how to join Fresno's new Community Benefits Commission, and what you should know before you apply.

The city is seeking commissioners to help spend a portion of business tax revenue from cannabis dispensaries.

If you are interested in participating in local government, influencing city spending and bringing new ideas to the table, a position on the City of Fresno's Community Benefit Commission might be right for you.

This commission will give you the opportunity to influence how the city spends taxes it collects from the sale of cannabis.

Nine seats of the City of Fresno's Community Benefit Commission are vacant and ready to be filled for the first time.

How do boards, committees and commissions work in Fresno?

In the city of Fresno, a myriad of boards, committees and commissions are a way to provide feedback and guidance to the city on a variety of issues such as police reform, transportation and housing. Boards encourage public engagement, providing another opportunity for people to share their opinions on how local government should work.

What is the Community Benefit Commission?

The Community Benefit Commission was instituted in 2018 with the passage of Measure A which created a cannabis business license tax for commercial cannabis businesses and medical dispensaries in Fresno. These businesses are taxed, based on their revenue and how many square feet of live cannabis production they possess.

While 90% of the revenue from the tax is deposited into the city's General Fund to be used for unrestricted purposes, the other 10% is deposited into the Community Benefit Fund, to be overseen by the Community Benefit Commission. As of an update delivered by city staff in February, the money in the fund this fiscal year is expected to be \$2,113,100.

What does the Community Benefit Commission do?

Members of this commission recommend potential uses of the Community Benefit Fund to the Fresno City Council based on the council's goals, but the council has the final say on

how money in the fund is sent. According to Sontaya Rose, the city of Fresno's director of communications, the council's current goals for the fund usage include: improving social equity in economic development, health, and transportation needs, funding public safety and community beautification efforts near commercial cannabis businesses and low-income areas, as well as expanding youth development programs.

Am I eligible for a seat on the commission?

According to Rose, Fresno residents, who do not work for the city or have conflicts of interest, are eligible for a seat on the commission. A conflict of interest may be present if the potential candidate or a member of their immediate family has financial or professional interests that could be impacted by decisions this commission makes.

How do I join the commission?

If you want to serve on the Community Benefit Commission, you can apply for a seat using this application. There is currently no deadline for applications.

During the application process, you will be asked for details such as your contact information, home address, educational background and work history. Be prepared to provide three personal or professional references.

This application also includes shortform questions, where you have to briefly explain your qualifications for serving on the commission and why you are interested in having a seat.

Of the nine seats open on the Community Benefit Commission, seven seats will be filled by representatives of the seven districts of Fresno, with the remaining two seats selected by the mayor. Term lengths and limits for commission members still need to be set

Idon't know about you, but I love a good chicken sandwich. This is why the "chicken sandwich war" between national chicken chains and the current food trend of Nashville Hot-style chicken has been a thing of beauty to me. It has resulted in a proliferation of new "hot chicken" restaurants, all vying for our chicken money. Over-saturated, you say? I say not saturated enough! Give me all the fried chicken, please.

Thus, when I received an invitation from Houston TX Hot Chicken to come down to their new location in Fresno and give them a try, I responded with an immediate and enthusiastic "yes!" I have tried a couple of the other hot chicken places popping up

around the Valley, and I was eager to dive into the Houston TX Hot Chicken menu to see how they handled themselves in the ring.

First off, General Manager Andrew Tauscher could not have been more helpful and friendly. He asked me how much spice I could handle (spoiler alert: not much) and brought me a sizable sampling of items from their menu. We spoke briefly about what makes Houston TX Hot Chicken stand out from the competition, but the proof would ultimately be in the... well, chicken. So he suggested we just let the food do the talking, and what a conversation we had (the food and I, that is). Of

course, I didn't really talk to the food; it's a



metaphor.



First up was the original hot chicken sandwich - a thick, juicy, crispy-fried, and aggressively-seasoned chicken breast served on a soft, toasted brioche bun, topped with house-made slaw, pickles, and one of their signature sauces. The restaurant makes its slaw fresh, and it was exquisite. It had a great tang that delightfully complemented the chicken and the sweet and savory house sauce. As impressed as I was with the sandwich, I was equally impressed with the price - \$9.99 for a large sandwich of this quality felt like an insanely good deal. Add their well-seasoned crinkle-cut fries for only \$3 more, and you've got a delicious but very filling meal for about what you'd pay at a fast food joint.

Next, I partook of their loaded fries - a heaping bowl of seasoned fries topped with slaw, pickles, chopped-up tenders, and house sauce. These things were over-the-top in the best possible way. Once again, I was blown away by their flavor bomb of a slaw. Full disclosure, I'm generally not a huge fan of coleslaw, so believe me when I say that their slaw ultimately makes this dish. That's not to take anything away from the other ingredients, especially the tenders. For spice lovers, topping these fries with hot tenders would perfectly pair with one of their ice-cold bottled or draft beers.

I decided to dip a toe into spicy waters by ordering a single chicken tender with medium-level spiciness. For me, this was an appropriate level of heat, just enough to dance around on the back of my throat, but not so much that it took away from the vibrant flavor of the chicken. Houston TX Hot Chicken uses only free-range chicken and all-natural

ingredients; their commitment to quality is clearly expressed in the tender itself. I could taste how well-seasoned and prepared the chicken was before adding sauces. Houston TX Hot Chicken uses a combination pressure cooker and fryer to get perfectly-cooked fried chicken in a fraction of the time it takes using a conventional fryer.

After the tender, I tried their plain Belgian waffle and mother of pearl. It was delightful. The waffles are cooked with a dusting of sugar that forms a light, crunchy coating. It tasted like a cross between vanilla cake and a glazed donut. Adding syrup seemed unnecessary as it would likely mask the delicately balanced flavors.

But the dark horse of the whole spread, and quite possibly the most incredible thing I have ever tasted from a restaurant, was their blueberry lavender frozen lemonade. Words cannot fully describe the. Honestly, I would go back there to order this lemonade and nothing else. It was tart, tangy, sweet, and refreshing. The lavender notes elevated the lemonade to another realm of flavor. And for all you vodka lovers, you can add a shot of vodka to your lemonade for only \$4.

Between the lemonade, sauces, chicken, and artfully crafted slaw, I am comfortable saying this is quite possibly Fresno's best hot chicken restaurant. The quality, the customer service, and, most of all, the prices are outstanding. So, if you've got an itch for a mouth-watering chicken sandwich, Houston TX Hot Chicken will certainly scratch it.

Forestiere Underground Gardens

In the early 1900s, Baldassare Forestiere envisioned a truly unique way to escape the sweltering Fresno heat. Over the next 40 years, with no formal training, using only shovels, picks, and other hand tools, Forestiere dug a series of tunnels and catacombs beneath what was at the time unused farmland in the Fresno countryside. He also planted fruit trees and vineyards in the underground garden, many of which are still thriving there today. The result was a truly remarkable subterranean oasis filled with trees, shrubs, vines, and ancient roman-inspired architecture that winds around 10 acres, and as deep as 25 feet. The microclimates created in Forestiere's underground gardens are up to 20 degrees cooler than the temperatures above ground, providing the relief from Valley summer heat that inspired his life's work.

Unfortunately, Forestiere never got to see his vision reach its completion. While his goal was to create a Mediterranean-inspired underground resort, what he did manage to accomplish is an impressive and expansive network of gardens, catacombs, and houses that attract visitors from all over the world. Thanks to the Forestiere family, the public can visit the underground gardens and marvel at Baldassare's creation. Tours are available daily and provide a fascinating look into both the early history of Fresno, and the mind of the man who created something truly one-of-a-kind just below the surface of what is now West Shaw Avenue.

The early history of Fresno's Chaffee Zoo is a rather vague one. No official records were kept, but available accounts describe it as a rather haphazard collection of unwanted pets and hoof stock that began in the late 1900s and continued to grow in a slapdash manner until it was officially recognized as a zoo in 1929. For the next 18 years, the zoo continued to expand and add new animals, until Eldon "Curly" Blocker was hired from the San Diego Zoo to serve as the first foreman. Under his direction, more elaborate exhibits were built. In 1949, the beloved elephant Nosey was purchased with help from the local Rotary Club. That same year, the Fresno Zoological Society was created to support and create interest in the development of the zoo, and help raise funds for expansion and maintenance.

For the next three decades, the Fresno Zoo would continue to expand, adding more and more exotic animal exhibits. But perhaps its most valuable asset would arrive in 1978, with the construction of the Edward A. Kane Reptile House. It was the first computer-controlled reptile exhibit in the world, capable of maintaining separate climate-controlled environments for each display. Expansion, development, and improvements would continue for the next decade, including the addition of the Tropical Rainforest exhibit. The Fresno Zoo was renamed the Chaffee Zoological Gardens of Fresno in 1990 in honor of longtime director, Dr. Paul S. Chaffee, who passed away that year.

In 2003, a fundraising drive, prompted by a letter of support from tenyear-old Angel Arellano raised \$700,000 for the zoo and led to the passage of Measure Z, which added a .01% sales tax increase with proceeds going to the maintenance, upkeep, and operations for the zoo. The measure brought in nearly \$200 million. In 2006, a private non-profit agency, The Fresno Chaffee Zoo Corporation, took over operation of the zoo from the city and the name was changed once again to "The Chaffee Zoo" as it's known today. Thanks in large part to Measure Z revenue, some major improvements were made to the zoo over the next ten years, including the massive African Adventure exhibit, which replicates the natural environment of the African plains and savannas, and features herds of lions, rhinos, cheetahs, and elephants all coexisting in the open 13-acre habitat.

Admission to the Chaffee Zoo is still pleasantly affordable. A family of four can get in for less than \$50, and year-long unlimited memberships start at \$75. With the recent restoration and remodeling of Storybook Land right next door in Roeding Park, there's nowhere else in Fresno where a family can have so much fun, and enjoy so many different activities, for such a great price. If you're looking for a fun family experience you'll want to return to over and over this summer, the Chaffee Zoo should be at the top of your list.




