Por me, food is an experience - it's home, family, adventure. But an artisan coffee paired with something joyfully sweet? Now, that's a combination ripe with the potential for a spiritual awakening. Bab Al-Yemen Cafe was a lesson in elevated coffee chemistry, but Bread and Butter reminded me that beauty also exists in simplicity.

Bab Al-Yemen Cafe

Nestled in an unassuming shopping center on the west end of Shaw, between The Curry Pizza Company and Triangle Burgers, is a powerhouse of flavors. While their impressive selection of traditional Yemeni coffees steals the show, Bab Al-Yemen also offers an array of appetizing Yemeni and Middle Eastern pastries.

Seeking an authentic experience, I hid my true intentions from the owner - I was not a reviewer or the editor of a local publication - but another fresh-faced customer trying his concoctions for the first time. I simply asked the owner for his most popular items and, with his help, selected a bevy of treats: mufawar, the Bab Al-Yeme latte, pistachio baklava, and khalyet nahel.

MUFAWAR

There was a time when I thought I was a coffee connoisseur, but one sip of the mufawar made it abundantly clear that I was, at best, a novice.

Mufawar is a medium roast coffee prepared with cream and cardamom. I was not ready for the explosion of spices that enveloped my mouth. I had never tasted anything like it - it was forceful, rich, smoky, and earthy. It had notes reminiscent of a slight peppery kick, similar to a good rye whiskey. The creamy bitterness of the coffee punched right through my tastebuds, stunning them into submission. Then, a confusing yet wonderful potion of spices floated in on the afterglow. It's a flavor I cannot adequately pin down in words, but I know that it was so enchanting that I unconsciously reached for the cup in pursuit of another sip and another until it was empty.

Mufawar isn't for the faint of heart. It's for those who don't flinch at taking their coffee black, order a scotch neat, and probably don't mind a bite of black licorice. It's the kind of drink that lives in your head rent free.

BAB AL-YEMEN LATTE

Where the mufawar slapped the first-timer square on her well-formed cheekbones, the latte led the way with a gentle hand.

Familiar to the more common American palate, the latte came dressed with a balance of foam-to-spice ratio. It's a double espresso with steamed milk accompanied by cardamom and cinnamon. While the spices put a delicate twist on the coffee that made me ashamed to have gone so long without it, I can't say that it was as memorable as mufawar. To be fair, it was a tough act to follow. But the latte presented a profile I already knew, but with a flourish - like seeing an old friend with a new hairdo.

The Bab Al-Yemen Latte is a first-timer's mellow introduction to a robust world of Yemeni/Turkish coffee.

PISTACHIO BAKLAVA

Anyone with the skill set to master the finicky phyllo dough enough to hold a rich, sticky, delightful center will make a fan out of me. However, I've only known baklava to be a messy ordeal - a crumbly outside, flaking all over the table, and a viscous core melting all over my fingers. But Bab Al-Yemen crafted a baklava that refused to let me lose a single drop of the chewy center.

The pistachio filling was subtle in its sweetness - not overbearing, but like a soft touch on the shoulder to remind you it was a dessert. It was almost maple-like, a first cousin to brown sugar. The crispy dough was airy, buttery, and far from oily - an artful pairing to its equally crafted core.

KHALYET NAHEL (Honeycomb)

Khalyet nahel is described as a cream cheesefilled bread drizzled with honey, cut into a pizza-style slice that is prepared like a pullapart bread. The top is lightly toasted, sprinkled with white and black sesame seeds, and kissed with honey.

Expecting a sweet treat, I was surprised by how the yeasted bread's aroma pushed forward ahead of the distinct flavor of honey. It was warm, light, fluffy, soft - like an elevated dinner roll delicately dancing between sweet and savory. And considering how expensive honey is generally and how liberal Bab Al-Yemen chose to brush the bread with it, I was also surprised at the size of the slice they served for \$7. Addiction is a strong word, but if I hadn't already filled up on the various treats I ordered - a person might come back with a nub if they tried to

finding a sweet oasis in a gluten-filled world.

**CLet's go out to dinner!" "Hey! Do you want some?" "Try this, it's delicious!!" These are phrases you have probably heard often if you are lucky enough to have friends. And these harmless expressions are usually, and hopefully, followed by delectable tasty delights. But what happens when you have to ask, "Is it gluten-free?"

When I was first diagnosed with Celiac Disease in early January of 2020, everything changed. I had so many questions for anyone who might have answers. However, as time passed and my need for food remained constant, my questions

dwindled to a single staple: "Can I get that gluten free, please?"

Some food groups lend themselves very well to those who are gluten-less. Mexican food is, thankfully, typically gluten-free, and so is pho - depending on how authentic it is. However, the biggest food causalities in my life have been desserts. Much to my dismay, most of those delightfully sweet treats contain gluten. Fortunately, over the years, more and more places are starting to have gluten-free options!

The first: Ampersand.

Now, I know that picture looks very uninspired. But that is part of what makes this place great. It does not need to be more than what it is: ice cream that does not rely on artificial flavors and sugar to be good. Above is a double scope of strawberry ice cream. Notice how the color is not offensively red. This particular ice cream does a wonderful job of working with the natural tart and sweet combination of the berry while adding a subtly sweet and creamy finish.

The best part? They have an allergy scoop! When asked for it, the workers will go into the back, pull out

a clean scoop, and scoop from a brand-new ice cream container. This prevents all possible cross-contamination. Will you frustrate the twenty-something working behind the counter with this request? Yes. Is it worth it? Every. Time.

The Second: Indulge Right Bakery

While some would argue that a pastry is not a dessert, I beg to differ. They certainly can be desserts, and that is good enough for me! This lovely bakery is 100% gluten-free. From their cinnamon rolls to their homemade biscotti, there is not a single gluten in

sight. My personal favorite is the blueberry scone. The pastry itself is soft and crumbly. With each bite, the buttery pastry melts into your mouth with surprise pops of sweet blueberry. To top it off, literally, there is an indulgent glaze over the top that has just enough lemon to make it a party.

Of course, as any good bakery should have, they also have phenomenal chocolate chip cookies and brownies. The

chocolate chip cookies from this business make the Girl Scouts run for the hills. At room temperature, they have just the right amount of bend before breaking. The pastry is sweet with a slightly salty taste that works very well with the sweetness of the chocolate. They leave a taste that will have everyone reaching for a second, third, and fourth. As to the brownies, they are considered pretty easy

to make. Yet something about these brownies is different. They are not the chocolate bombs that overload the senses with sweetness. They are moist chocolate cakes with a slight crunch from the top and a respectable amount of chocolate chips.

While most places find that gluten-free means twice the price for half the flavor, this place rises above. Their pastries deliver in a big way, especially with the ease of not worrying if the bread will kill me. Unfortunately, this establishment does follow

the trend that gluten-free is quite expensive. My only hesitation for this bakery is the price. Does that stop me from going back? No. But do I go as much as I would like to go? Also no.

I hope this has shed some light into the dark, dessert-less world in which those restricted from partaking in gluten due to arbitrary autoimmune disorders live. I highly recommend both es-

tablishments, and I am happy to say that all the items from Indulge Right and Ampersand have been entirely gluten-free.

Psychedelic therapies show promise. Is California ready to bring them into the mainstream?

 $\operatorname{P}^{ ext{sychedelics}}$ are having a moment. A nationwide push to bring magic mushrooms and other psychedelics into the mainstream is gaining traction, and some Californians want in.

While hallucinogens are often associated with the drug culture of the 1960s, today's movement on psychedelics is largely about using them to help treat the nations' ballooning mental health crisis. Growing research portrays the drugs as a promising tool in helping people heal from various mental illnesses, including depression and post-traumatic stress disorder.

Now several proposals floating around in California seek to make psychedelics more accessible for therapeutic and personal use. These include one legislative proposal that would decriminalize use of certain natural hallucinogens and two pending initiatives for next year's ballot, one that would legalize the use and sale of psilocybin mushrooms and a second that would fund a \$5 billion agency to research and develop psychedelic therapies.

One recent UC Berkeley survey offers a glimpse of where the public currently stands on these types of reforms. For example, more than 60% of those surveyed supported psychedelics for therapeutic use. Seventy eight percent supported making it easier for researchers to further study psychedelics. Meanwhile, 49% said they supported removing criminal penalties for personal use.

Some researchers, doctors and parents urge caution around personal use because psychedelics aren't for everyone and potential risks are still not all that well understood. Use of these substances should be done with safeguards in place, they say.

The bill to decriminalize plant-based psychedelics faces a key test this week at a hearing that could determine whether it moves forward this year. Senate Bill 58, by Sen. Scott Wiener, a San Francisco Democrat, would ensure that people do not get arrested for possessing and ingesting specified quantities of psilocybin and psilocin, the psychoactive ingredient in hallucinogenic mushrooms; mescaline; ibogaine and dimethyltryptamine, or DMT.

The bill does not, however, legalize the sale of any of these substances.

"A huge number of people right now in California are using psychedelics, despite the fact that it is banned," Wiener said during an Assembly Health Committee hearing last month.

Decriminalizing these substances, he argued, promotes responsible use. "If you think you're doing something wrong, you're less likely to seek information or talk to someone about how to be safe," he said.

His bill would also order the state's health agency to form a workgroup that would make recommendations regarding supervised medical use of these psychedelics — although any psychedelic-assisted therapies first need approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Adminis-

This is the second time Wiener has tried to decriminalize psychedelics; the first failed last year. This time around his bill is more narrow in that it excludes synthetic psychedelics, such as LSD.

If Wiener's bill makes it through the Legislature and across the governor's desk, California would follow Oregon and Colorado, where voters have already decriminalized psychedelics. Some cities in the Golden State are a step ahead — Oakland, San Francisco, Santa Cruz and most recently Berkeley, have already passed measures that order law enforcement to back off arresting people for using plant-based psychedelics.

Benefits and risks of psychedelics

Supporters of decriminalization point to promising data about some psychedelic-assisted therapies now in end stages of clinical trials, such as the use of MDMA (commonly known as ecstasy) to treat symptoms in patients with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Additionally, psilocybin, found in hallucinogenic mushrooms, is being studied for treating depression. For example, early data from The Johns Hopkins Center for Psychedelic and Consciousness Research, has shown that psilocybin therapy can reduce major depressive disorder symptoms for up to a year.

Wiener has taken combat veterans and retired first responders to testify before the Legislature about their "transformational" experiences using psychedelics to help relieve suicidal thoughts and PTSD symptoms.

According to the U.S. Veterans Affairs Department, about 6% of the U.S population will have PTSD at some point in their lives. About 1 in 5 adults live with a mental illness, according to some national estimates.

Researchers believe public attention on the worsening mental health crisis during the COVID-19 pandemic may also play a role in this renewed interest in psychedelics.

"Suddenly you've got this discussion about mental health issues in a way that, at least in American culture, we really hadn't been discussing," said Jennifer Mitchell, a neurology professor at the University of California, San Francisco who has been working on the development of psychedelic therapies and collecting safety data.

Mitchell opposes Wiener's decriminalization bill because she believes access to psychedelics for therapeutic use should come before personal use.

Currently, psychedelics are only allowed for clinical research. If and once therapies are approved by the FDA, those lessons, she argues, could then help inform safety guidelines for personal access.

"[Psychedelics] are actually exceedingly safe physiologically; psychologically, is where we get into trouble," Mitchell said. "Because if you take a drug and think you can fly, you're capable of self harm. If you take a drug and think you can breathe underwater, you are capable of self harm. And those are the types of reasons why when you take a psychedelic, we want you to be in a facilitated environment where you're being watched and well main-

A California mother's campaign

One powerful voice opposing Wiener's bill is a coalition led by mothers who have lost a child to an adverse reaction after ingesting psychedelics. Kristin Nash, for one, has widely shared the story of her son who died two months before his college graduation. In blogs and Op-Eds, Nash has shared that in 2020, Will took two grams of psilocybin mushrooms and in his altered state mistook a jar of protein powder for a water jug and suffocated.

Nash now runs a foundation named after son, William, through which she works to raise awareness and advocates for harm reduction efforts, such as better tracking of adverse reactions and training for college campus responders. Nash said she is not against allowing veterans and others to use these substances for treatment, but she'd like to see Wiener's bill amended so it includes safety measures for per-

Nash, who also has a background in public health and most recently worked at an AIDS nonprofit, is a participating author in a Stanford-led study (yet to be peer reviewed), that showed emergency room visits in California linked to hallucinogens jumped 84% from 2,260 in 2016 to 4,161 in 2021. But that data includes a spectrum of substances, from plantbased psychedelics to MDMA and ketamine. Authors note that currently data is collected in

a way that makes it difficult to comb for specif-

"I don't believe people should be arrested for possessing and using mushrooms," Nash told CalMatters. "These are being used whether we legalize them or not. And so I would argue that we need these safeguards. When we make this policy shift, we know that use will increase further, that adverse events will increase further, and so I feel like we don't have to choose between social justice, equitable access and safety, we can do all of those things."

Mushrooms on the ballot

California voters may hear more about psychedelics next year even if Wiener's bill fails as advocacy groups attempt to qualify ballot initiatives for the November 2024 election.

One group, Decriminalize California, is looking to legalize hallucinogenic mushrooms. Its proposal goes further than Wiener's bill by legalizing not only possession, but also the sale and commercialization of these substances. If approved by voters the measure would go into effect in January 2025.

"Originally we wanted to go for all psychedelics, but the problem was there wasn't enough public comprehension about what else was out there," said Ryan Munevar, campaign director at Decriminalize California. Noting that voters are a lot more familiar and likely more comfortable with magic mushrooms than any other psychedelic drug.

A separate measure would ask voters to approve \$5 billion in bonds to create a government agency that would focus on psychedelic research with the goal of developing therapeutics. The idea, according to proponents, is to dedicate more resources to research that shows promise but has for long been under-

Dr. Jeannie Fontana, the chief executive officer of TREAT California, who is spearheading this initiative, said California's lead on innovation makes it the ideal location for this type of research. TREAT stands for Treatments, Research, Education, Access and Therapies.

"The federal government is not there yet. They recognize the problem, but they just don't know how to deal with this psychedelic hangover from the '60s and '70s," Fontana said. "California is a progressive citizenry. We are innovators and leaders in many things."

Fresno mayor wants 10,000 people to live in the city's downtown. Here's the plan

Fresno has received nearly \$300 million from California to help revitalize the city's struggling downtown.

On top of the \$250 million in state funds for revitalizing downtown Fresno over the next three years, the city is set to receive \$43.7 million in state grants to build downtown infrastructure for housing.

City officials said the new funding from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) will finance key infrastructure improvements to water, sewer, streets, and parking to support a minimum of 862 downtown housing units — of which 557 are marked for affordable housing.

"The overall intent is to create a vibrant downtown where the folks who live

there will not have to rely on a vehicle should they choose," Mayor Jerry Dyer told Fresnoland. "There will be walkable neighborhoods where they can buy groceries, go to a pharmacy, go out to dinner."

\$43.7 million for revitalizing downtown Fresno

\$16.8 million for sewer improvements \$14.3 million for water infrastructure improvements

\$11.7 million for a structured parking garage on Fulton Street

\$913,000 for street improvements near the Tuolumne Street and Van Ness Avenue intersection

Dyer said the goal of revitalizing Fresno's Downtown is to increase its residents from 3,000, currently to 10,000. After that, "your downtown really takes off on its own," Dyer said, adding that it will take both the \$250 million and \$43.7 million state investments to get there.

After the infrastructure is built, the City of Fresno will release a request for proposals so developers — local ones and those based outside Fresno — can submit plans for developing land for the minimum of 862 housing units.

"We have to be very intentional about how we as a city make investments that will attract developers to do what they do," Dyer said. "It is a catalyst for the development of housing that will eventually create momentum that will allow us as a city to step back and watch it flourish."

Going forward, the state grant funds must be approved by the Fresno City Council.

Monday's announcement was also the same day public feedback ended on the environmental impact report regarding a major city expansion project in Southeast Fresno.

Dyer has said that increasing housing supply is a key method to stabilizing rent in Fresno, but his administration has yet to say how much it will cost taxpayers to turn 6,700 acres of Southeast Fresno farmland into 45,000 new homes.

reach for my honeycomb uninvited.

Aside from a stunning first impression, part of what made Bab Al-Yemen Cafe unique was how far removed it was from the typical "hustle" embedded in most other coffee shops. The ambiance invites you to stay rather than rush out of the way for the next customer. With its deep-seated leather chairs and light Middle Eastern music wafting in the air, it begs you to have interesting conversations with friends or to enjoy a drink in quiet reflection. Without effort, it invites you to come back - soon and often.



Bread and Butter

Filipino desserts never held my attention as a kid - my mom often picked up her favorites from the Asian markets while saying, "You won't like it." Growing up in America, with its sickly sweet standards for candy and desserts, rather than in the vibrant neighborhoods of my mom's hometown of Olongopo, she was right. I just wasn't mature enough yet. Now, I understand what all the fuss is about.

Bread and Butter is a Fresno-based Filipino bakery driven by a mission to bring world-class Filipino cuisine to food connoisseurs. With a brick-and-mortar bakery on the corner of Gettysburg and Fresno St., Bread and Butter regularly appears at the newly established Tower District Farmer's Market.

PAN DE UBE

If ube isn't already a staple in your list of goto treats, you're doing desserts wrong. Ube is a purple yam native to the Philippines that maintains a vivid violet-purple color throughout the cooking process. Like its relative, the sweet potato used in so many southern candied yam recipes - ube is slightly sweet, slightly nutty. Or, for you boba fans, ube is reminiscent of the famous taro flavor profile but with less intensity. And pan de ube is a traditional Filipino sweet roll filled with an ube pudding or paste in the center.

Bread and Butter offers a batch of roughly half a dozen rolls, each about the size

of a baseball, for \$7. It may seem like a commitment, at first, to purchase them in bulk rather than in singles - especially for an ube virgin. But don't worry, Bread and Butter know what they're doing. As sure as I am that the sky is blue, you'll eat every last crumb.

The roll is dense but not heavy and has a light, chewy texture. The ube filling in the bread's center pocket is thick but creamy, similar to cheesecake and pumpkin pie, holding its shape until your tongue smooshes the filling across the roof of your mouth. It is somewhat grainier in texture, but where cheesecake kills you in richness, ube calms the palate with delicately sweet pistachio/vanilla notes.

Pan de ube is a complimentary companion to a cup of coffee or tea. Enjoy it as a stand-alone snack or as a dessert. If you're looking for a sinfully luscious treat, this isn't for you. For me, it'll have a permanent home on my kitchen island to satisfy my newly developed, ube obsession.

SEÑORITA BREAD

A Filipino Spanish bread, the roll is oblong, like a short hotdog bun, but prepared somewhat like a cinnamon roll. The key ingredients are melted butter and sugar, with a light dusting of bread crumbs around the outside for some added crunch.

It was no surprise that Bread and Butter had such a fundamental Filipino bread in their repertoire of offerings. Patrons can

expect to get a full dozen of the warm, buttery, sweet breads for \$15 total. Naturally, I couldn't leave their table without one.

The señorita bread was compact and tightly rolled so that the melted butter oozed out along the edges of the rolls. Like the pan de ube, the rolls were dense, but it seemed more appropriate in this context because the thick bread was a suitable vessel to soak up any stray filling from the bottom of the container. Once the rolls cooled, both the bread and the butter hardened. However, mixed with the sugar, the buttery fusion created a rich, candy-like texture along the outside. Re-heated, the bread softened again and absorbed the melted butter back into itself, balancing the dryness of the bread.

Dessert connoisseurs might vehemently disagree with my choice to include sweet breads as desserts here, but any category worth its salt will have range. There is a time and a place for earth-shatteringly rich delicacies, and there is undoubtedly a time and place for subtlety. I don't like to overwhelm my palate, and I find that limiting my exposure to those luscious delights preserves the experience in its purest form. Choosing to experience the subtle sweetness more frequently than a crushingly rich one makes my palate more sensitive to nuanced flavors hiding in every dish. Not everything needs to hit hard like a hammer - there is so much beauty in the simplest things; we just have to be willing to look for them.

Kogetsu-Do Confectionary

Sugimatsu Ikeda first opened Kogetsu-Do on

Kern Street in Fresno in 1915. Shortly after, they found their forever home on F Street in 1920, where his granddaughter Lynn Ikeda runs the shop today. For 107 years and counting, they have been making mochi, manju, and ice cream using the same recipes handed down for three generations. Even the syrup in their sno-cones comes from the original Ikeda family recipe. Mochi is a rice cake steamed and pounded into a chewy, elastic paste, then molded into various shapes. When used as a confection, mochi is wrapped around fillings such as red bean paste, fresh fruits, and ice cream. Manju is similar to mochi, except it's

prepared with flour instead of rice (Kaget-

su-Do uses cake flour) and red bean paste.

Manju confections are also filled with sweet

ingredients.

Kogetsu-Do is the only traditional Japanese confectionery in the San Joaquin Valley and one of only a handful in the country that prepares the traditional New Year's mochi and rice cakes. During the warm summer months, Kagetsu-Do serves sno-cones with homemade lemon or strawberry syrup. You can even order your sno-cone with an ice cream or sorbet scoop in the middle as an added treat. They have been a not-so-hidden gem in Fresno's Chinatown for decades. Loyal customers know to get there early because the lines are long and they sell out fast. And if your favorite flavor happens to be sold out, fear not; Kogetsu-do will take large-quantity and special orders as long as you call about two or three days ahead.

ON THE SCENE -**HELPING HOARDERS**

Everybody knows somebody who is messy or a collector of knick-knacks, but more and more people are coming forward in need of help with the over-accumulation of stuff in mass quantities. Collecting and neglecting are easy when much of life revolves around cheap goods, convenient delivery, exhausted schedules, and well-being that fall by the wayside of underlying health

conditions. A cocktail of items and illness or trauma can ultimately lead to a hoarding situation, which can be difficult to escape without help. The first hurdle in seeking help re-

quires overcoming thoughts and feelings about shame. Those who come forward often experience a fear of judgment. Families are sometimes embarrassed that they didn't know their loved one was hoarding or that they didn't help them sooner-hoarders themselves can be extremely self-conscious and protective of the things they have accumulated. So, when you get a hoarder or family member asking for help, it is a monumental step forward.

Reaper Clean, Fresno's local biohazard remediation company, receives hoarding clean-up inquiries a few times per month from all across the Central Valley. This initial conversation is crucial in determining the next steps and comfortability for all parties involved. However, being able to provide an estimate or service doesn't always happen right away. A family member may be calling on behalf of a hoarder, and the hoarder may not be aware that their loved one has called for help. Sometimes, the person is deceased, and the family is just finding out about the death and the over-accumulation of stuff all at once. Or, there may be declining cognitive abilities or health conditions that would require rehabilitation or coming to terms with a new kind of care/legal arrangement, all of which may need to be planned out before the team can step in. Before respirators go on and shovels come out, some ground rules have to be established for safety.

Crime Scene Cleaners cannot go into a hoarding situation without consent and cannot quote hoarding jobs without first walking through and seeing the hoarding

themselves. Consent also has to be in writing and must be verbally maintained throughout the entire process. The level of privacy should also be discussed, as well as the details of the removal and any cleaning expectations. There is

also a likelihood that repairs will be needed afterward - something Crime Scene Cleaners cannot do. Once a home is emptied, it will require a lot of additional work that may involve different field specialists (structural and pest-related) to bring the home back to a livable condition. There is no telling what that is until the hoarding has been removed and the space can be thoroughly evaluated.

In most cases, it is best that the hoarder not be present during the clean-up. It can take an emotional toll on the person as well as the team, and maintaining healthy boundaries is essential. It can also impede the amount of work being done. An example would be living in areas of the home where access was needed, cross-contamination, unwillingness to throw out specific personal property, conversing/distracting workers, or bringing things back inside that were already removed. If hoarders cannot leave their homes but are willing to cooperate, it can be done, but labor hours will vary based on the situa-

Reaper Clean has worked on hoarding jobs from start to finish in many different circumstances. The compiling of gross filth, trash, random items, animal waste, or packages may be familiar territory, but getting to know a person through their things has a way of bringing their humanity to the surface. From a young RN who fell into a deep depression and turned to alcohol during the onslaught of COVID-19 to a retired grade school teacher with declining health also caring for her elderly pets and husband with dementia—hoarders weren't always living like this. Something happened to them, and something can happen again to create change for the better.

Their setlist is punctuated by comedic interludes and skits.


